I have in my possession, the "last will and testament" of Job Carlock, proved in Overton County Court, June 25, 1859 and signed by his daughter, Analiza Carlock Howard and her husband, Nelson F. Howard. The will states that the widow of Job - Elizabeth Johnson Carlock - is to draw money raised from the estate until her death. Then all money left in the estate is to be divided among those specified in the will. Analiza then assigned her interest in the estate to her brother, Jacob G. Carlock, since they were the only ones mentioned in the document.

I also have in my possession, a copy of a land deed where Job Carlock sold 85 acres in Overton County for \$125.00. He did not sign his name but made his X mark.

Job Carlock, my great-great-grandfather and the father of Alcy, was born August 27, 1777 in Rockbridge County, Virginia, died in Overton County, Tennessee, February 2, 1855 and is buried in the Allred Cemetery east of Alpine. As previously stated, he married Sarah McDonald in 1798 and they became the parents of Alcy Carlock, my great-grandmother.

Sarah McDonald was born in 1778 in Tennessee, died in 1815 and is probably buried in the Allred Cemetery. Job was the son of Hanchrist Carlock who was the son of David Carlock of the German Palatinate.

Hanchrist Carlock served in the Revolutionary War. He enlisted between July 1 and August 1, 1776 and served under Colonel William N. Christian of Washington County, Virginia and fought against the Indian allies of Great Britain. He then served under General George Washington for the duration of the War, paid taxes in what became Bath County, Virginia in 1782, was an itinerant preacher and served as a Road Commissioner in Augusta County.

His services with General Washington in the American Revolution are well documented, thus making all of his descendants eligible for membership in all Revolutionary War societies. } F.Y.I.
