

Nicholas P. Frazier (b. May 17, 1845; d. Mar. 27, 1923; Evensville, Rhea County; bur. Buttram Cem. Dayton, TN) enlisted as a private in the Confederate Army on October 1, 1862, at the age of 17, and served in Company D, Nineteenth Tennessee Infantry Regiment. His older brother, Joseph G. Frazier, was captain of Company D before he was killed on December 31, 1862.

Nicholas P. Frazier served throughout the remainder of the Civil War and was in all the battles of his regiment. It is related that he was wounded in the Battle of Chickamauga, September 19-20, 1863. On December 16, 1864, he was captured near Nashville and was sent to Camp Chae in Ohio, but he was paroled there and transferred to Point Lookout, Maryland, for exchange on February 17, 1865. In later life, he said that after the war, he never signed the oath of allegiance to the U. S. Constitution as many Confederates had to do if they wished to regain full U. S. Citizenship.

He married (1) Anna M. _____ (b. ca. 1847.) Five sons known and there may have been other children.

 and (2) Sarah J. Johnson on Feb. 20, 1901, Rhea County, TN (b. ca. 1850, Allegheny Co., Pennsylvania). There were no children of this marriage. After the death of her husband, she made her home with her stepson, Will H. Frazier, in Chattanooga, TN.
