attaching comments by Timothy Barlow; 2018 thank you for the information Mr. Barlow. Your comments are very helpful in distinguishing George Christian Sr. from George W. Christian his son. I haven't made corrections to the following notes yet with the exception of a correction noting Harriet Christian married to James Eldridge was the sister of George Christian and not his daughter who is also named Harriet. (debra 2018)

George Christian Sr was never referred to as George W. Christian, only as George Christian. Whenever you see George W. Christian it refers to his son (1802-1892). In fact it is modern descendants like myself that calls old George Christian (1769-1770) George Christian Sr. He never used Sr or any middle initial W., Or a middle name. George W. Christian was a very wealthy man. He did a lot of business in the Upper Cumberland and regularly in Nashville. Lumber and the making of barrels out of his lumber. He bought and sold land. He was elected 3 times as Overton Co Circuit Court clerk. Elected Overton Co Sheriff. He paid the bank note in question by himself.

The following court mins. involve Thomas <u>Eldridge</u>. In some of the mins. Thomas is mentioned with George Christian also. Christian was the brother in law of my 4th Great Grandmother Catherine <u>Eldridge</u> McCormick. These records give me a connection to Thomas Eldridge being the brother of Catherine Eldridge. The court mins. also reveal to me that these family's who are shown in census records to hold valuable property and assets began in 1860 at the time of the Civil War to experince financial repercussions of that period. George McCormick my 4th Great Grandfather and husband of Catherine is also mentioned in the following excerpt' of those mins.? (*not sure if the following court entries are referring to George Christian Sr. or George Worth Christian Jr.*)

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Thomas & amp; William S. EAKIN and Adam G. ADAMS Vs. Thomas <u>**ELDRIDGE</u>**, Brinkley MAYNARD, George W. CHRISTIAN & amp;</u> Sherrod M. KEETON – DEBT<u>(George W. Christian was married to Elizabeth</u> <u>McCormick, sister of Geroge and Catherine Eldridge McCormick</u>) my 4th Great Grandparents

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Bank of Tennessee Vs. William A. OFFICER (Administrator of Thomas W. OFFICER), <u>George MCCORMACK</u> & amp; James C. OFFICER & ndash; DEBT (<u>George McCormack is my 4th Great Grandfather, Officer's are seen on the census</u> <u>living nearby in TN. This is of interest since they are both mentioned I question if</u> <u>there was a business they were involved in together. Once census reports Farming</u> <u>and Manufacturing under occupation, then a tax list shows George being taxed for a</u> <u>Mill or Still)</u>

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Bank of Tennessee Vs. Thomas F. & amp; William H. BURROUGHS, George W. CHRISTIAN & amp; Ferdinand H. DAUGHERTY & ndash; DEBT (<u>again George</u> <u>W. Christian who was married to Elizabeth McCormick is mentioned. I am not sure if</u> <u>this entry is indicating the bank is vs. all of these men in a group, or is this is just a</u> <u>list of all who the bank was vs. that day?</u>)

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below are other entrie's that might also be related to the stress of the Civil War period.

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Thomas **ELDRIDGE** Vs. Rachel (BIAS) ELDRIDGE – DIVORCE(<u>possible</u> <u>brother of Catherine Eldridge McCormick</u>)

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Bank of Tennessee Vs. Peter J. MYRES & amp; others & ndash; DEBT(*possibly the Myers family that Julie McCormick married into*)

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James **ELDRIDGE** Vs. John LAWSON – ASSAULT and BATTERY (most likely the brother of my 4th Great Grandmother Catherine Eldridge McCormick. Noting that her brother James was married to Harriet Christian sister of George Christian married to my gggg Aunt Elizabeth McCormick Christian

I have only posted a few of the court entries that are related to family members, but must mention that I was so suprised to see that there were a great number of entries for divorce in this area during the time period. Also several entries for tresspass, assult were seen among the neighbors of my family. What a trying time for these folks to endure. With the everday life responsibilities of keeping a home, working a farm and providing the basics needed for the family the Civil War brought so many new hardships. Disputes of neighbors that disagreed on the issue's of the war. The often documented strife of living with the threat of Bushwackers or those that took advantage of the men folk being off fighting then robbing, raping and sometimes killing those elderly or very young male and female family members that remained at home. Our family's home state of Tennessee was known to be split in the decision to join the succession of the Union and become involved in the Civil War. Tennessee being one of the last states to join the succession. How sad that the issues of slavery though not directly connected to many of the family's of the area that never believed in slavery or owned slaves still created suffering and hardships for them simply because they had farms in this area.
